LONG ISLAND GRANTS FOR THE ARTS ARTS EDUCATION GRANT

Formerly Creative Learning In School and After School/Community Organizations

*Supporting the role, the arts play in engaging students and participants of all ages
through sequential, hands-on arts instruction.*

APPLICATION DEADLINE: Friday 3/13/2026, 5pm

Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit one week in advance, at minimum, of the deadline. Please note that no late applications will be accepted and no exceptions will be made, including in response to technical difficulties.

AWARD AMOUNT: \$5000*

PROJECT PERIOD: January 1, 2026– December 31, 2026

WHO MAY APPLY: Individual Artists, Artist Collectives, 501(c)(3) or New York State non-profit organizations with an active board of trustees either incorporated in NY State or registered to do business in NY State. Government or quasi-governmental entity in Nassau or Suffolk counties. Tribal organizations in New York State.

****Arts Education grants will be awarded at 100% of the \$5000 funding amount.***

The Arts Education grant is designed to support arts education projects that bring teaching artists into dedicated learning spaces for students of all ages.

Funds support arts education projects for closed groups of learners.

All Arts Education projects must be carried out in partnership with a public school or in partnership with an existing closed group of learners *including but not limited to* a club, residents of a senior living facility, individuals receiving social services, or a camp.

In all AE projects, emphasis is placed on the depth and quality of the creative process by which participants learn through or about the arts. Projects must focus on the exploration of art and the artistic process.

Statewide Community Re-grants (SCR) are county based. Community Arts programs must take place in the same county where the applicant resides. Community partners must be located in the same county as the applicant.

Individual artists and organizations that have applied directly to the New York State Council for the Arts (NYSCA), regardless of funding status, for 2026 funding OR have received multi-year funding that includes FY 2026 are ineligible to apply for Statewide Community Regrant (SCR) opportunities.

All Arts Education projects must provide:

- Sequential, skills-based study that incorporates one or more art forms and includes a *minimum* of 3 sequential hands-on learning sessions.
- In-depth, age and skills appropriate learning opportunities.
- Hands-on, participatory creation and/or learning opportunities in one or more art forms that *may* culminate in exhibitions, productions, or demonstrations by the dedicated learners.
- Stated learning goals, methodologies, and outcomes
- Means for evaluation
- Support materials that include a lesson outline and participant evaluation forms.

All applicants must attend a mandatory Information Session before applying for an SCR grant.

Eligible Applicants

Individual artists, groups or collectives with a designated lead artist, and unincorporated entities that are proposing:

- Programming with a partner K-12 Public School taking place during the school day or in an after-school program on school grounds.
- Community based learning with an eligible community partner. These projects take place in a community-based setting such as a library, community center, care facilities, or community organization.
- Artists, collectives and unincorporated groups must apply with a non-profit organization partner.
- All applicants must be 18 years of age at the time of submission

Individual artist applicants and lead artist applicants (for unincorporated groups) must be current New York State residents and must be residing in the county where their proposed project will take place. Proof of residency is required. All documents must contain the individual's name and address and documentation must be dated no earlier than two years prior to an application.

Acceptable proof of residency must include ONE of the following:

- Telephone bill
- Utility bill
- Credit card or bank statement (first page only; social security and financial information should be blocked)
- Current lease or mortgage agreement listing the applicant' name and NYS County address.
- NY State Driver's License or ID card
- Voter Registration Card

Non-Profit Organization Applicants -

All non-profit organizations must provide proof of non-profit status. This includes direct organization applicants, non-profit partner organizations and Fiscal Sponsors.

ONE of the following documents must be submitted with the application:

- Letter of Determination from the IRS indicating tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3) and registered with the Charities Bureau.
- Current NY State Bureau of Charities (Office of the Attorney General) filing receipt.
- Documentation of charter by the NY State Board of Regents under section 216 of the NY State Education Law
- Documentation of incorporation under Section 402 of the NY State Not-for-Profit Corporation Law
- Official authorization as an arm of local government (i.e., a formal letter on official stationery signed by the appropriate county, city, town or village executive)
- Authorization as a federally recognized Tribal Nation

***Note: NY State tax exemption certificate, 990 and/or CHAR 500 do not qualify as proof of nonprofit status.**

*Organizations **MUST** comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, ensuring accessibility for disabled Persons.*

INELIGIBLE APPLICANTS:

- Individual artists or organizations that have applied directly to NYSCA, regardless of funding status, for 2026 funding OR have received multi-year funding that includes FY 2026.
- Students enrolled in a full-time degree program.
- Public universities, colleges; and public, private, or parochial secondary and elementary schools. New York State agencies and departments including SUNY schools and 402 foundations.
- An individual or group that is a business corporation, limited liability company (LLC), or limited liability partnership (LLP), or incorporated as a 501c4s and 501c6.
- Non-Profit organizations and community partners that do not have a Nassau or Suffolk county address registered with the IRS.
- Past re-grantees that have failed to submit final reports.

****REVIEW APPENDIX A. ATTACHED FOR COMPARISON OF IN SCHOOL VS. COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMMING****

Eligible Expenses

SCR grant support should be primarily directed toward artist fees but may include administrative support and the cost of materials, such as:

- Artist Fees - Payment to the teaching artist to facilitate the classes.
- Administrative Fees - Fee for organizing the implementation of the program e.g. buying materials, organizing teaching artist schedule, liaise with school or partner organization.
- Supplies and Materials - Consumable supplies and materials required to complete the proposed program.

Ineligible Expenses

Funding will not be provided for the following:

- General operating expenses
 - Operating expenses of privately-owned facilities
 - Permanent equipment or capital improvements
 - Cash prizes, juror fees, scholarships, fellowships or other awards to students.
 - Programs in which children are used as professional artists (paid a fee)
 - Regrants by applicants to fund other activities
 - Acquisition of works of art, art restoration, or art preservation
 - Contingency funds
 - Lobby expenses
 - Start-up or seed funding for the establishment of a new organization
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Program Criteria:

Applications are evaluated on the following criteria:

- **Program Description** - Depth and quality of the creative process by which participants learn through or about the arts. Exploring art and the artistic process in all disciplines.
- **Goals, Strategies and Outcomes** - Stated learning goals, methodologies and outcomes.
- **Support Materials** - Lesson Plans or Lesson Outline, means of participant evaluation
- **Budget** - *Proposed programs must include a balanced budget. A balanced budget will include the total project income, inclusive of the SCR grant funds that equals or exceeds, total program budget expenses. The budget cannot be in deficit.

Additional Required Documentation:

A letter of commitment from the school or organization partner must be included with the application to be eligible for funding. The letter must detail the partner(s) support of the project (monetarily and/or otherwise) and anticipated roles and responsibilities for each partner involved. The partnership letter should be on the partner(s) letterhead and signed by the principal of the school or director of the partner organization.

The criteria are weighted according to these percentages:

- Program Description: 40%
- Goals, Strategies and Outcomes 30%
- Support Materials: 20%
- Budget: 10%

****Incomplete applications will NOT move forward to panel review for funding consideration****

Panel Review Process:

Funding decisions will be made by a review panel administered by the Huntington Arts Council. They will evaluate and score submissions giving recommendations for funding. Panelists include community leaders and arts and culture professionals who have a vested interest in the arts and culture sector on Long Island.

Post Award Responsibilities

All funded Arts Education grantees must complete the following steps:

- Submission of completed, signed Contract and W9
- Submission of completed Initial Project Schedule
- Display of LI Grants for the Arts logo and credit line on all marketing and promotional materials, if applicable
- Submission of marketing and promotional materials for community engagement, if applicable
- Final Report completed and submitted no later than 30 days after the completion of the funded program.

Optional

- Attendance at HAC Share & Tell event to encourage connections and collaborations between SCR grantees.

APPEALS

As part of the funding process, an applicant may appeal the funding decision. The following are valid grounds for appeal:

- Non-presentation of information:
Information known to the Council staff prior to the Council's decision that was not presented and that might have altered the decision.
- Misrepresentation of information:
Information known to the Council staff prior to the Council's decision that was changed in its presentation and that, if presented differently, might have altered the decision.
- Improper procedure:
Contention by the applicant that: 1) the review of the funding request by the appropriate panel was biased; 2) the decision by the Council was arbitrary and capricious.

NOTE: Dissatisfaction with the denial of an award or with the grant amount is not an eligible ground for appeal.

Appeals Process for Applicants:

- Denied applicants have 10 business days from the funding notification date to appeal the funding decision.
- To begin the appeals process, the applicant must first speak with the SCR Coordinator to receive application feedback.
- Once the applicant has received application feedback, a formal letter to the Executive Director of the SCR site must be submitted, citing the specific ground(s) for the appeal, and requesting that the decision be appealed.
